Good news for gearheads! The Star Filling Station has been listed to the National Register of Historic Places!

In its heyday, this small gasoline station served the community and passers-by in the high plains town of New Raymer in northeastern Weld County. It is situated at the historic commercial intersection of Centre Avenue and Brock Street, one block north of Colorado State Highway 14.

Star Filling is notable for its early twentieth century design as a gasoline station consisting of an enclosed room with a projecting, open canopy that provided shelter for the drive-through fueling lane. It is also important for its association with the development of commercial automotive services, as this mode of transportation became prevalent beginning in the 1920s.

By 1925, when the station was constructed, America's enthusiasm for the automobile was growing, and industrial giants pushed the bounds of technology to design automobiles with increasing reliability and comfort with each new model. Buying on credit and making installment payments also came into vogue, bringing the cost of a car within reach for many families in the emerging middle class. As each year passed, Americans living in cities large and small, as well as on farms and ranches, abandoned their horse-drawn carriages in favor of the latest models produced by companies such as Buick, Ford, Dodge, Chevrolet, Oldsmobile and Chrysler. However, just as horses needed to be cared for, automobiles required regular maintenance, including fuel, lubricants, tires, batteries and occasional repairs.

They lived in New Raymer for many years. Cora married George Kellner, and they lived northeast of Raymer. Their daughter, Geneieve married Warren (Jack Fiscus) and their other daughter Jewell married Jake Artzer. Thara's grandparents, Nathan and Susannah (Winterrowd) and his Uncle, George Winterrowd, are buried in the Raymer cemetery.

Married at Morgan hast Thutaday, December 19th, Mr. Thara Addington and Miss Florence Mercer, Rev. Steele of the Methodist church officlating, the ceremony being performed at the parsonage. Mr. Joe Cavis and the mother of the groom only were present.

On Saturday the young people went to Sterling and visited over Sunday at the T. Addington place in Sterling, returning Monday to Raymer, where Mrs. Addington served a wedding feast for the newly weds and a score of their neighbors.

The groom is the son of Mr and Mrs. William Addington, saw several months service in France and is a very industrious young man.

The bride is the beautiful daughter of Mr. Grant Mercer, for whom she has kept house for many years.
